ALMOND ALL IN ONE

All-In-One produces heavy crops of soft-shell nuts with sweet, flavourful kernels. This variety can be grown in Northern areas as it needs less winter chilling than other selections but needs a hot summer to ripen. Frost hardy. Semi dwarf - 4.5m.

ALMOND MONOVALE

Monovale produces hard-shell nuts with good flavour. Due to their strong flavour this variety can be used for Marzipan. A heavy cropper and good pollinator. Disease hardy variety. Vigorous grower.

APPLES

APPLE BALLARAT

A heritage Apple which bears large apples that are ripe towards the end of April. The fruit are green with a red blush and the cream flesh is lovely and juicy. A great apple for cooking - it stores very well too.

APPLE BELLE DE BOSKOOP

A large, orange-red, russeted heritage apple. Popular in Europe as a cooking & fresh eating apple. Apple is firm and crisp, with full, tart flavour. It is very aromatic & gets sweeter in storage. Stores for 3-4 months or more. Forms an open, wide-spreading and weeping tree. Spur bearing, crops mid to late season. Flowering Gp. 3 (Cox's Orange Pippin, Gala, Granny Smith). Triploid (needs 2 pollination partners nearby which must both be of different varieties & able to cross-pollinate each other as well as the Belle de Boskoop).

An early season variety. A high-quality dessert apple with smooth yellowish-orange skin mostly covered with bright red and deep carmine striping. The yellow flesh is fine-grained, crisp and juicy. Will produce heavier crops when pollinated by other varieties such as Discovery, Kidd's Orange, Peasgood Nonsuch, Spartan & Worcester Pearmain.

MULBERRY HICKS EARLY

Dark red/black fruit (similar to a boysenberry) about 15mm long. Fruit form on year old wood. Will fruit in 2 years. Habit: Cross between Morus Alba x rubra. Fast growing deciduous tree with large oval serrated leaves. Size: Upright tree reaching 6 x 6m over 10 years. Pollination: Flowers appear early spring. Small yellow/green pendulous catkins separate male and female. The male is more slender than the female. Both appear on the one tree. Self fertile & wind pollination. More than one tree will increase fruit set. Harvest: Ideally spread a cloth below the tree and let fruit drop onto this as crop can continue for 3 months. Daily collection is ideal.

CURRANT BLACK SEFTON

Black Sefton requires less chilling than the traditional black currant, will grow where raspberries grow. Large sweet fruit

Habit: Shrub of multi-stemmed canes with large soft green leaves which when crushed have a strong currant fragrance.

Size: 1.5 x 2m deciduous bush

Pollination: Self-fertile but yield will increase if plant two or more plants.

Harvest: Late December - February. The berries are firm and easily picked.

Expect a few berries in the second year after planting, heavy crops by the fourth year. Then will be in production for ten years or more.

CURRANT MAGNUS

Sprigs of shiny black round, juicy berries and fruit is borne on last season wood.

Train along a wire or use a frame to contain the canes. Care Feed regularly with sheep pellets or for a natural option use Aquaticus Organic Garden Booster. Water regularly through summer. Prune out weak, fruited and old canes in winter.

ORANGEBERRY

A native of Taiwan, this spectacular, fast-growing, evergreen groundcover is from the same family as Strawberries and Raspberries. Please Note: This is an amazing groundcover but a reluctant fruiter, the trigger for fruiting is still a mystery. However when it does fruit you will enjoy!

Medium sized bell-shaped fruit with orange flesh. Fruit are ripest when the calyx has reflexed to expose the berry fully. The fruit when ripe has a tangy flavour reminiscent of orange cordial.

Habit: Orangeberries are stunning with their dense mat of miniature, tough, dark-green, grape-like leaves that are frost tolerant and have a purple tinge during winter. An excellent plant for weed suppression or to stabilise banks, to prevent erosion, and wonderful in pots or hanging baskets with the rich foliage flowing over the sides, trim the edges to maintain size It is not just for ditches or slopes, it looks particularly nice when grown in a raised bed or planter and allowed to cascade over a wall or container. Some landscapes have difficult sites, such as hot, dry, erodible slopes or ditches where soil moisture fluctuates from very wet to very dry. Not many plants tolerate these conditions, but Orangeberry, *Rubus pentalobus*, is one that will. In fact, it not only survives, it thrives under harsh growing conditions.

Size: 15-25cm tall, with a cover of, 2 square metres spread.

Pollination: Bees & insects, pollination may be the problem. Eg. cold or windy conditions that affect bee and insect activity at flowering (early spring). After research carried out it has now been established that orangeberry is in fact infertile and requires cross pollination from another member of the rubus family. Although our trials are still continuing we believe that raspberries and blackberries will pollinate the orangeberry.

Harvest: Delicate white flowers arrive in spring followed by bright orange fruit for Xmas. Ripe fruit "touch pick" to give berries with no woody core. Orangeberry takes 2-3 years to fruit. Early summer.

WORCESTERBERRY
